
Exploring the use of OpenOffice.org as a courseware authoring environment


Abstract

The University of Southern Queensland has developed a high end XML publishing system known as GOOD (Generic Online/Offline Delivery) for managing the production and delivery of courseware to print, web (via a Learning Management System) and CD-ROM. This system builds on the Distance and e-Learning Centre's decades of experience as a distance education institution. This paper presents **preliminary** experiences in customizing OpenOffice.org Writer to serve as an easy-to-use front-end to the GOOD XML publishing system. It also looks at the additional potential for using OpenOffice.org as part of a low-end single source publishing solution for courseware, including export to industry-standard IMS courseware packages.



- Cross-platform functionality not complete.
- Export is not ready!
- List styles less than ideal for our purposes

Progress at USQ

- Input from FrameMaker / Word and OpenOffice
- Rudimentary XHTML output for complete courses achieved (but the export system is still a problem)
- One Pilot course more coming
- Tentative moves to OpenSource
