LAUNCHES GLOBAL SCHOOL INITIATIVE, "OOoEDU"**

October 13, 2003 - OpenOffice.org today celebrates the 3rd anniversary of the founding of the open-source office suite development project by announcing a major drive called "OooEDU" aimed to bring OpenOffice.org ss1.1 office suite to students, schools and universities in all countries of the world.

Leading the OOoEDU initiative is Ian Lynch, an esteemed OpenOffice.org contributor with a life-long commitment to education and technology. He is based in the UK.

Says Lynch, "Many governments are concerned about the technological divide and the inequality caused by the cost of technology. At OpenOffice.org we believe in inclusion and we are determined to help as many students as possible gain access to the best technology at the lowest price. Eliminating software licensing costs is our way of making a contribution."

Lynch adds, "Our main objective is to get as many students as possible using OpenOffice.org, whether at home or at school. Volunteers in countries around the world are providing OpenOffice.org 1.1 to their local schools free of charge on CD-ROM. Schools in the UK -- including Skipton Girls High School, a Specialist Engineering School for Girls sponsored by Rolls Royce -- are using this as an opportunity for global citizenship by getting students to burn OpenOffice.org 1.1 CDs for schools in areas of the world with no broadband access. This is good education, not just good economics. It has the potential to get pupils in contact across the world and generate greater international understanding."

The OpenOffice.org office suite runs on FreeBSD, Windows (98/ME/2000/XP), Linux (x86 & PowerPC), Mac OS X and the Solaris OS; while ports for other operating systems and hardware platforms are in various stages of development.

OpenOffice.org is written in C++ and has documented API's licensed under the GNU Lesser General Public License (LGPL) and Sun Industry Standards Source License (SISSL) open source licenses. The founder and sponsor of the OpenOffice.org project is Sun Microsystems, Inc. Sun markets the StarOffice[tm] Office Suite that is based on the OpenOffice.org code.
